

Sexting

Sexting is the term used for sending or receiving sexually explicit texts, images or videos via mobile phones, computers or tablets.

It can be seen but creating or sharing images of a child is illegal, even if the person doing it is a child. A young person is breaking the law if they:

- Take an explicit photo or video of themselves or a friend.
- Share an explicit image or video of a child, even if it's shared between children of the same age.
- Possess, download or store an explicit image or video of a child, even if the child gave their permission for it to be created.

Prevention Advice

- As soon as you press send you lose control of the image. Your image could be posted anywhere on the internet, social media sites or even porn sites
- Don't send anything that you wouldn't want your parents, teachers or friends to see. Even if you completely trust the person you are sending it to someone might accidentally see the image
- Remember screen shots can be taken off webcams or phone apps
- If you ever feel pressured or threatened into sending a photo or video, or if someone tries to bully or blackmail you into sending one, you should speak to an adult you trust straight away or call the police. We have specially trained officers to deal with these types of incidents
- If you're sent a sexual image or video do not share it
